The Solstice Art Centre Grafton Architects



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
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The Solstice Art Centre was origianlly built in 2006 by the Grafton Architects. It is located in Navan, Ireland in the middle of a market district. The original intent of the building was to be a courthouse with a theatre underneath, but was later turned into a art gallery and theatre space.






The Solstice Art Centre was also built with an intention of letting light in seemlesly. With large open curtain walls, it allowed for ribbons or light to be cast on to the outside parking lot. On top of large windows, they use large beams to create large flowing spaces with minimal columns or supports





After the purpose of the building was changed from a courthouse with a theartre underneath, it is now a space where people gather to show off artwork as well as have live performances. The theatre seats 320 people and the original courthouse is also used as a space for artists and actors.















Individual and Collective

The two spaces represented here show the two distinct closures within the building. The bottom floor is wide open and inviting to the public. The top floor is more for an individual space where someone can either work or show off their own personal art work.




Parti

The Solstice Art Centre is broken into two pieces. The main idea of the structure was to have a heavy, more closed off feeling. Comparing this to the bottom floor which is the complete opposite as it is inviting and open.




Outside and Inside

The comparasion as well as the seperation from Outside to Inside, the architects tried to create a seamless entrance from the outside of the building. They achevied this by using a wrap around curtain wall that lets light in from almost all angles.




Programatic Heirarchy

Using one of the floor plans and breaking it down to a basic form, each program on that level is laid out and can be categorized accordingly. The theater and stage are the most essential places on that level followed by the common area for people to gather before a show, then the actor's area, and finally the outside service yard.




Arrival Sequence



Since the theater is located in a market area, some people might not even know they are parking there. If people are in fact seeing a show, however, they would have to cross the street and walk up the side walk a little bit to get to a public entrance.



Urban Context




Asymmetry


Solid and Void


The roof of the Solstice Art Centre is not your typical roof as it is one that it has voids taken out of it, striding away from a standard flat roof.



Public and Private




Manipulation of Light

This building, while not having many windows on the top level, is one large glass wall on the bottom floor. It brings light into the building and creates a usuable space all day long while using minimal artifical lights to brighten the space.




Load Bearing Forces

The building here is broken up into a couple of load bearing beams and columns. With only a few columns, it allows the building to feel wide open. It also allows for large gatherings. By using minimal supports it allows for an open space for artists alike to create and share.



Structure and Enclosure

The limited structure within this builing allows for it to be mostly enclosed. The interior spaces, while jagged in some spaces, make an inviting open space for people to gather.



Deeper Analysis

Upon first looking at the Solstice Art Centre, a person with architectural insight might ask, how is the heavy top floor made with limestone able to be supported by the bottom floor that is a curtain wall. By analyzing the building and constructing a basic 3D model, the essentials of how this is possible is shown. In this diagram there are three main aspects. The first is the light blue shading which represents the curtain wall, second is the dark blue shading which relates to the main structure walls that support the top floor, and finally the light gray which represents the limestone. By pulling up the top floor, it is seen how this building supports itself. Another thing to note about the limestone portion is that the "skin" of the building was raised up to reveal an in depth materality characteristic of the limestone in that the building is actually covered with limestone tile panels and is not just one piece.
